Corbin's Corner

September's meeting was a truly great meeting and if you missed it not to worry as next time we meet will be for our annual Auction! The Auction will be held at the VFW; our normal place of meeting. It will be the third Saturday of October, the 16th starting at noon but doors will be open at 11am for preview. Orchids ranging from rare species to the most vibrant of hybrids. Fragrance from sweet and divine to rich spices like cloves and vanilla to excite the senses. For those daring there will even be some very outrageous Bulbophyllum. These are the orchids your collection needs! We also need your participation to make this auction great!

Back to September's meeting. We hosted Tony Millet that we last saw in May and a brand new vendor to the amazing Orchid World, Joshua Jones of "The Orchid Den". Rumor has it that the "Den" in his name is for dendrobiums as they are his specialty. Josh grows and hybridizes his own "antelope" type dendrobiums or dendrobiums from the section spatulata. Josh brought in some of his pottery and ceramics. He talked about the differences between high fire and low fire clay and what earthenware and stoneware are. Josh also described his potter's techniques. One of my favorite pieces is the "branch". A clay branch made using a cast that was molded around an original piece. I like this piece because it mimics a branch that some orchids would naturally grow on. Great for mounting smaller more compact species of orchids such as the Cattleya walkeriana he had displayed.

Tony came back in September with his very chivalrous gift of 20 orchids for the raffle table. Tony has been in orchids for a very long time. He is a hybridizer using rare cattleya species and unique color forms. He actually used to be a main hybridizer for the "Bonnet House" in the Miami area. When Tony was in his 20's he started up orchids. He always

loved growing by seed and needed more of a challenge than the vegetable and fruits he was used to growing. Three years into orchids Tony had created and flaked out his first hybrid of a dendrobium. Ever since he has been making new hybrids and enjoying orchids. Tony had a great presentation on cattleyas and their dominant traits. He touched base on many orchid grower's favorites, the brassavola nodosa. This species has very dominant shapes. When using this as a parent you can guarantee that the offspring will have large round lips and very thin petals and sepals. Also interestingly enough nodosa hybrids are often spotted when most nodosa we see are a pure whitish green color. Tony also talked about what he said to be one of his favorite species, cattleya violacea. The violacea is a very very flat bloom that comes in many color forms. I have in my own collection the coerulea form and the flamea form. Tony recommends this species because it comes in many different forms, practically all that a species can come in.

After covering the bases on why we choose certain cattleyas to hybridize with and what traits are very dominant on them, Tony mentioned what to look for when purchasing an orchid. With many orchid shows coming in the near future and lots next year it is great to know what you should be looking for. Tony told us it is all in the look of the plant. The way the orchid looks is a good determination of how the blooms will present themselves. We should be looking for wide leaves that are flat and even, rather than ones that are curled over, thinner and/or may be droopy. The ones with those nice wide leaves that are flat will often have the large, flat, round and symmetrical blooms we look for when choosing an orchid to hybridize with.

All the talk of what the plant looks like and how that can predict the quality of the blooms go right back into his talk about breeding. Those are the plants kept to breed the next round of babies. Every generation of hybrids or even species breeding should improve upon the last, setting the "new" standard for that species or even hybrid. This could be in your breeding program or acknowledged and awarded by the AOS.

Now most of us are not planning on going through the extensive breeding process but keeping these things in mind when purchasing orchids that are either young or not in bloom will help you get the best blooms into your collection. Enjoy your orchids and remember we need your support and your plants; if you are willing to part with some divisions or even plants that just will not bloom for you; for our auction this month on the 16th. Remember also our spring show in March; it may seem far away but the time will fly; we need member participation to make things like this happen.

October: The Month of Insanity

Gearing up for a Season of Indoor Growing

Those of you who have the luxury of living in a climate where tropical orchids can remain outside through the winter cannot imagine the brow-furrowing vexations endured by those of us who have to sequester our orchid collections to safety before the winter season. Not only is every square inch of windowsill or greenhouse bench space already spoken for, many orchid nurseries choose this time of year to advertise lower prices and bargains. After all, many of them need to pack up for the winter too. I learned long ago that I cannot resist an orchid sale so my windowsills and benches will always be filled beyond capacity through the inclement weather.

This is the kind of obsession that many of us share. Some would call it passion, others pathology. However, due to our fascination with the outrageous diversity displayed in the tens of thousands of orchid species and the never-ending array of spectacular and easy to grow hybrids, we must resign ourselves to slavishly devoting hours of our personal time, and dedicating vast amounts of space and financial resources to our collections. Are we insane? Well, if so, we are in good company. Some extremely respectable individuals (not I, of course) are secret orchid growers. You would never know it if you saw them at work or on the street. They seem normal enough, with respectable careers, devoted spouses and above-average children. But we know that we are living on the edge, seized by an uncontrollable mania that immerses us in that beautiful and mesmerizing world of orchids. If you have not yet reached capacity, what are you waiting for?

CLEAN UP YOUR ACT Your collection grew well this summer thanks to all the excellent care you gave it after reading about the plants in *Orchids*. Those that summered outside received plenty of rainwater, excellent light and air movement. Many have put on large new pseudobulbs. Cattleyas are forming sheaths, phalaenopsis are hardening their newest growths and dendrobiums are producing terminal leaves on their long canes, basically finishing their vegetative growth for the year. Now is the time to prepare the winter growing space, be it a windowsill, light room or greenhouse. If you have not already done so, take the time to clear out debris from last year, clean and sterilize the surfaces with a disinfectant and plan your strategy for getting all your orchids safely inside for the winter.

NO HIDDEN PASSENGERS With many of your warmer-growing plants, such as vandas and angraecoids, about to come in for the winter before the first cold snaps, September may be your last chance to check your orchids for hitchhiking critters. Any number of undesirable winter residents may have invaded orchids that are outside. Sucking insects, such as mites, scale or mealybugs, are often decimated by the beneficial insects that live in our yards or washed away by rains, but sometimes, small enclaves of these pests survive. Take the time now to look over plants carefully and treat any pests accordingly. Even though they may not be visible on the leaves, colonies of ants sometimes invade the porous interstices of orchid mix. These cannot be tolerated and could cause you a lot of grief if allowed in the greenhouse. Once discovered, the ants must be evicted either by drowning or drenching with an insecticide. It is always a good idea to repot such plants in fresh medium as the old mix is likely to be seriously broken down or badly acidified by the formic acid released by ant habitation.

FLOWER POWER Many hobbyists anticipate the approaching blooming season for many orchids, including cymbidium, phalaenopsis and dendrobiums, by fertilizing plants less frequently and with a lower concentration. In particular, the use of high-nitrogen fertilizers this time of year can inhibit blooming by encouraging plants to continue growing foliage. For orchids that you are expecting to spike in the autumn, switching to a blossom booster fertilizer now can give plants the extra boost they need to flower extravagantly.

THE LITTLE DEATH A few orchids — deciduous dendrobiums, lycastes, many terrestrials (*Habenaria*, *Cynorkis*) and some members of the *Catasetinae* — are showing brown-tipped or yellowing leaves now. Do not be alarmed. Usually shortly after the autumn equinox, as day length starts to shorten, many orchids adjust and slough off leaves in preparation for dormancy. Most of these are benefiting from the cooler night temperatures after enduring the summer heat and are genetically programmed to shut down their metabolisms. Respond by letting these plants dry out and holding back plant fertilizer. Overwatering now can lead to rot problems later in the autumn.

JUST ONE MORE It is so tempting to load up on new orchids during those ubiquitous autumn sales. I certainly cannot preach to anyone about the virtues of restraint when it comes to orchid acquisition, so I hereby release you from any guilt you may be feeling about crowding your collection too much this winter. It may be irresponsible of me to tell you this, but we are what we are. I believe the correct word is “enthusiasts.” So go for it. Order a few new sale plants from orchid nurseries. And have fun.
